This presentation addresses an issue often neglected by the current literature on political corruption. That is, why do citizens support corrupt governments? It is hypothesized that people in countries where government institutions are weaker and patron-client relationships stronger are more likely to support a corrupt leader from whom they expect to receive tangible benefits. Statistical evidence from a cross-national analysis of citizens in 13 countries supports the hypothesis. Such findings have important implications for the scholarly debate on democratic accountability and good governance, as it shows that as long as corrupt leaders can satisfy their clientelistic networks by manipulating government resources, they are likely to retain political support. This, in turn, questions the assumption that a few administrative reforms can weed out corruption in countries where formal and informal institutions provide numerous opportunities for this phenomenon to thrive.
