Undergraduate Internship Opportunity

The College of Arts and Sciences (University of Pittsburgh) has approved internship opportunities for undergraduate students interested in Latin American Studies. Presentation

Bolivia: Service and Learning among Tumultuous Politics and Rising Indigenous Identity

Join four Pitt students and the professor with whom they worked as they recount their experiences studying and serving with community organizations in Cochabamba, Bolivia this past semester through the nonprofit organization Amizade Global Service-Learning. The group will share their perspective on the current political situation in Bolivia based on their experiences 'on the ground' over the past several months, and will also discuss how the service placements with community organizations helped them deepen and critique their learning in respect to development in Latin America. The presentation will integrate the daily experiences of being in Bolivia with the academic effort to better understand the current state of affairs in Bolivia.

The professor, Dr. Nicholas Biddle, holds a PhD in Latin American History from Duke University, spent considerable time in Ecuador during the formation of CONAIE and the rise in indigenous identity there, and writes on democratic movements. Dr. Biddle continues to lead the service-learning semester that Amizade offers in Bolivia, for which credits are conferred through a partnership with West Virginia University.

Study Abroad & Research Opportunities

University of Pittsburgh - Schools of the Health Sciences Student Global Travel Grants to Research Global Health Issues

Overview

The Student Global Travel Grants are intended to partially support international travel expenses for masters or doctoral students enrolled in one of the six health science schools, the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs, or the School of Law at the University of Pittsburgh who wish to conduct research in an international setting. The research project must address a global health issue, and preference will be given to projects conducted in a developing country or resource-poor setting. This grant program is sponsored by Dr. Donald S. Burke, Associate Vice Chancellor for Global Health, Health Sciences.

Eligibility Requirements

- Full-time degree-seeking masters or doctoral students in one of the six schools of the health sciences, the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs, or the School of Law at the University of Pittsburgh Oakland Campus are eligible to apply.
- Awardees must be enrolled at the University of Pittsburgh at the time of application and when using the award.
- Applicants must be in good academic standing at the time of application and when using the award.
- Only one (1) award per student per calendar year is allowed.
- The research project must be a component of the student's University academic program, offer the student hands-on experience, and address a compelling global health issue.
- For purposes of this grant program, research is broadly defined as " an activity that contributes new knowledge that can be used by participating partners in country for further research or program development, contribute to program improvement, or be used as pilot data for a thesis or dissertation." A variety of activities can qualify as research, including laboratory and bench science, quantitative and qualitative data collection, needs assessments, policy analysis, program evaluation, surveillance, and secondary data analysis.
- Applicants may propose participation in a new international project, join in an existing international project, or continue in a project in which the applicant participated in the previous year.
- Applicants must identify at least one (1) faculty advisor at the University and one (1) advisor at the performance site to support the application and serve as mentors for the project.

Amount and Number of Grants

The maximum grant amount is \$3,000. Up to thirty (30) grants will be awarded each calendar year.

Allowable Expenses

- Ground and air transportation to and from the project site
- Lodging and meal expenses while participating in the project
- Visa and immunization expenses required for travel to the project site
- Direct project-related expenses, with the exception of computers or equipment

Non-Allowable Expenses

- Travel, lodging, and meal expenses for individuals other than the applicant

- Travel, lodging, and meal expenses for non-project related activities
- Computers
- Equipment
- Membership fees
- Tuition or course fees
- Language study
- Non-project related internships
- Conference fees
- Copy and duplication costs
- Books and subscriptions

Grantee Obligations

- Awardees must complete and sign all University-mandated liability and release forms before grant funds are disbursed.
- Awardees must provide written verification of other sources of available or expected funding to meet remaining project costs.
- All research involving interventions or interactions with individuals or the collection of identifiable private information concerning living individuals requires prospective Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval. Awardees are responsible for obtaining IRB approval when required and must provide documentation of IRB approval before grant funds will be disbursed. If IRB approval cannot be obtained prior to the Student Global Travel Grant submission deadline due to circumstances outside the applicant's control, a written explanation with the expected IRB approval date must be attached to the application.
- Awardees are required to present their work in a poster session during the University's annual International Week. Failure to participate in the poster session will disqualify the recipient from receiving future Student Global Travel Grants.

The National Security Education Program (NSEP) provides a unique funding opportunity for U.S. students to study world regions critical to U.S. interests (including Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America & the Caribbean, and the Middle East). The countries of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are excluded.

NSEP was designed to provide Americans with the resources and encouragement they need to acquire skills and experiences in areas of the world critical to the future security of our nation in exchange for a commitment to seek work in the federal government. As students of other cultures and languages, Boren Scholars and Fellows begin to acquire the international competence needed to communicate effectively across borders, to understand other perspectives, and to analyze economic and political affairs.

The National Security Education Program includes three components:

- The *National Security Education Program David L. Boren Scholarships for Study Abroad* offers opportunities for U.S. undergraduate students to study in world regions critical to U.S. interests but generally underrepresented in study abroad.
- The *National Security Education Program David L. Boren Fellowships* enable U.S. graduate students to add an important international and language component to their graduate education through specialization in area study, language study, or increased language proficiency.
- The *Language Flagship* offers Fellowships for advanced language training in Arabic, Central Asian languages, Korean, Mandarin, Persian, or Russian

NC State University 15th Annual Ethnographic Field School, Summer 2008 - "Nature, Heritage Conservation and Globalization in Mayan Communities"

Students learn how to do ethnographic fieldwork, design a research project, carry out independent research and study the effects of globalization, tourism and change on the local culture, society and environment in the Mayan communities of Lake Atitlán. During the seven-week program students live with local, Maya families in the Lake Atitlán area of the Western Highlands, a region with an ancient and rich cultural heritage. The effects of globalization and tourism growth are having a significant impact on their way of life and on their quality of life. In this seventh summer of research in Guatemala, we will focus on the cultural, social, economic, health, and environmental impacts of tourism and globalization on the indigenous Mayan communities around Lake Atitlán. Students will study how these Tz'utujil, Kaqchikel and Quiche Maya are adapting to changing demographics, the effects of the global economic slowdown on the traditional exports such as coffee and textiles, as well as on the continuing presence of more and more tourists and foreign residents. The program is also affiliated with the Universidad del Valle-Guatemala City (UVG) and the Universidad del Valle-Altiplano (Solola).

Study Abroad in Costa Rica

The University of Florida (UF) Center for Latin American Studies has developed a new semester-length study abroad program for undergraduate students at the Universidad de Costa Rica (UCR) in San José. The program will be directed by Dr. Mark Thurner, UF Associate Professor of History.

All program participants will enroll in intensive Intermediate or Advanced Spanish (taught by UCR faculty) and in Latin American History and Culture (taught by Dr. Thurner). Program participants will also enroll in 1 or 2 elective courses taught in English through UCR's Academic Program for International Students. Students will earn a total of 12-15 credits. Lodging and meals will be provided by host families. It is anticipated that 15 students will participate in the inaugural program in Fall 2008. Undergraduate students from any major with one year of Spanish language study (or the equivalent) and a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 are welcome to apply.

The program fee for 12 credits is \$7206 and includes tuition, lodging, most meals, international health insurance and emergency medical assistance. It does not include round-trip airfare, lunches during the week, personal travel, field trips for select UCR courses and personal expenses.

The Center for Inter-American Policy and Research (CIPR) invites applications for a research fellowship for the Academic Year 2008-2009. Applications from the social and historical sciences in the fields of international relations, international political economy, comparative institutional studies, and policy studies are encouraged. Latin American expertise and Spanish fluency required. Fellows will be selected based on intellectual merit and the potential impact that their research and experience could have on the strategic advancement of CIPR's programs.

The fellowship entails a one year, residential, full-time appointment and carries a stipend of \$47,500 plus benefits. Contracts might be extended contingent upon funding and based on the development of program objectives. Library Visiting Fellowship Program 2008 - Yale University Library, Latin American Collection

Yale University Library is pleased to invite applications for one short-term library visiting fellowship to promote scholarly use of its collections of Latin Americana. The fellowship includes a stipend of \$10,000 plus modest funds towards the cost of travel and supplies which are meant to help defray expenses in traveling to and residing in New Haven, Connecticut during the tenure of the fellowship, which will be for three months. This fellowship is tenable from May to October 2008.

The program is designed to provide junior scholars based in the United States and specializing in Latin America with the opportunity to work with one of the oldest and largest Latin American collections in the country. The Yale Library contains a wealth of research material, including monographs, serials, pamphlets, newspapers, government documents, manuscripts, maps, photographs and documentary film. A flexible program will be developed to balance the individual goals and interests of the visiting fellow with the needs of the Yale Library. Approximately 20% of the time spent at Yale will be devoted to a library project.

Candidates for this fellowship must have a Ph.D. and be U.S. citizens. Applicants (junior faculty, independent researchers) are asked to submit a research proposal not exceeding three pages in length and a resume to the Council on Latin American and Iberian Studies at the address given below. Applicants must also arrange for two confidential letters of recommendation (in English) to be sent to the same address.

The proposal should address specifically the relevance of the Yale University Library collections to the proposed research. Prospective fellows are invited to consult the Library's home page at <http://www.library.yale.edu/> and its online catalog <http://orbis.library.yale.edu/> for information about Yale's collections. Applicants should have specific Yale resources in mind - not simply a desire to make use of a major research library - as they prepare their proposals.

A committee consisting of members of the faculty, the library staff, and the Council on Latin American and Iberian Studies will award the fellowship on the basis of the relevance of the proposal to unique holdings of the library, the merits and significance of the project, and the applicant's scholarly qualifications. The Award will be announced by about May 1, 2008.

Call for Proposals

Latin America in Translation/En Traducción/Em Tradução - 2008 Call for Proposals

In the English-speaking world, Latin Americans are more often written about than read. As a result, the educated public in the United States continue to learn most of what it does know about the region from Latin Americanists who are themselves foreigners to the national realities they study. Since October 1990, the Carolina and Duke Consortium in Latin American and Caribbean Studies has been involved in an effort, however modest, to right this imbalance by establishing an ongoing editorial series, "Latin America in Translation/En Traducción/Em Tradução."

The Latin America in Translation Series is a joint initiative of the Carolina and Duke Consortium, Duke University Press (DUP), and the University of North Carolina Press (UNCP) and is directed by an editorial committee of faculty members and editors from the three sponsoring institutions. Since 1993, twenty-six books have been published in the series with several more scheduled to appear in the next two to three years.

The Series is designed as a vehicle for identifying, translating and publishing in English outstanding books appearing in Latin America in the social sciences and humanities (including literature), with special interest in books with an inter- and multi-disciplinary outlook or reach.

Nomination Procedures:

Interested scholars or authors are encouraged to nominate a title for consideration in the series. Only complete submissions will be accepted.

Please include the following:

1. A complete copy of the book. If a printed copy is unavailable, a photocopy of the book will be accepted. If requested, all copies will be returned upon completion of the selection process.
2. A brief statement of the book's importance within Latin America and for an English language audience. This may come from the author or anyone interested in nominating a title for consideration.
3. (Optional) Published editorial reviews of the book. If including newspaper or magazine reviews please include the complete reference for the source.
