Caribbean Reading Group Meeting—Invite

Date: February 1, 2015 at 6:30 pm

All interested faculty and graduate students are warmly invited to join the Caribbean Reading Group on Sunday February 1, 2015 at 6:30 pm, for a discussion with Professor John Walsh from the Department of French and Italian. We will be reading a draft of the introduction to his current book project, the provisional title of which is *Haiti in a Time of Reconstruction: Aesthetics, Ethics, and Humanitarianism.* The working title of the introduction is "Framing Haitian Stories, 1986-2010."

Abstract:

The title of the introduction refers to the founding of the Haitian Studies Association (HSA) in 1989 at Tufts University. In the introduction, my methodological hunch is that telling the story of the founding and

formation of this field is central to understanding the ideas of Haiti that can be read across a number of Haitian texts and film (fiction and nonfiction) following the 2010 earthquake. The primary motivation to share my work with the group is to see if this hunch is one that I should follow.

The post-Duvalier era sees a cautious optimism coming out of constitutional and educational reforms, as well as the political hope in the election of Aristide. The HSA's attempts to create and promote new narratives on Haiti should be understood not only against this backdrop of reconstruction but also as part of the shifting academic winds of the late 80s and early 90s. Over the course of the following 20 years or so, after another military coup, another U.S. intervention, and a series of natural disasters, culminating in the devastating 2010 earthquake, this optimism changed to what the writer Yanick Lahens now calls "active pessimism." Having been faced with so many reductive portrayals of Haiti at theextreme ends of the human condition, a number of writers and artists haveproduced counter-narratives that call into question representations of Haitian exceptionalism. My book examines the multiple ideas of Haiti in a range of narratives that interrogate the aesthetic, ethical, political, and humanitarian dimensions of reconstruction.

Previous meetings of the Caribbean Reading Group have occasioned wonderful discussions across disciplinary boundaries. We are looking forward to seeing familiar faces and new ones alike this time around. Please feel free to invite any colleagues or students who would be interested. As usual, we will provide wine, coffee, and dessert "para amenizar."

Subsistence Economy and Chiefdom Emergence in the Muisca Area: A Sstudy of the Valle de Tena by Pedro María Argüello García (PhD Candidate)

Abstract: Ethnohistoric and ethnographic accounts for the Andes describe "vertical economies" involving diverse production strategies and risk buffering through the exploitation of closely spaced but varied environments at different elevations. The northern Andes of Colombia do not provide as much altitudinal variation as the central Andes, but systems of "microverticality" have been proposed as vital components of chiefly political economy during prehispanic times. Spanish colonial accounts describe such a system for the Valle de Tena, a steeply descending zone adjacent to Muisca chiefdoms in the high-elevation Sabana de Bogotá. Archaeologically documented settlement patterns, however, are quite different from those expected from a microverticality model.

Keynote Speaker: Daniella Gandolfo, (Anthropology, Wesleyan University)

Scholars of Latin America have documented processes of urbanization, not only in terms of the growth of mega-cities, but also in the transformations of the countryside. They have considered how the organization of urban space, politics and society takes shape in relation to the city's outside or margins, as well as transnational norms, flows and networks. In her work on late twentieth-century Lima, Peru, Prof. Gandolfo analyzes how urban forces of disorder and contradiction resist incorporation into rational understandings of the state and neoliberal governance. In 2013, Colombian farmers took to the streets of Bogotá to protest agricultural policies enacted in the wake of free trade agreements.

The farmers were supported by many city-dwelling students who called themselves "descendants of the campesinos" demonstrating the proximity between political processes internal to the city and its "hinterlands." The port cities of Havana and Veracruz provide historical examples of how cities were formed in relationship to networks of exchange and the flow of goods; the two cities maintained such a close relationship of trade in the colonial period that their functions began to mirror one another. In these and other examples, the stable boundaries of urban space are put into question by something that is seen to be outside or beyond itself—be it disorder and excess, its margins or "hinterlands," or transnational economies.

We invite scholars from all disciplines and stages of their careers to reflect on the changing political, social, economic and physical landscape of the Latin American city, particularly as it is transformed in relation to its "outside" and at the nexus of colonial and postcolonial historical processes.
