<p>This course is devoted to the exploration of the historical experience of the lands between Germany and Russia from the time the region was first settled by Nomadic Tribes to the present. During these one thousand years Eastern Europe was transformed from feudalism to communism and our emphasis will be to understand the ways in which the interaction of social, economic, intellectual, cultural, demographic and political processes contributed to this metamorphosis.</p>

<p>This course takes place in Prague, Czech Republic and Krakow, Poland between 2 May and 19 May 2009. All interested students must meet with Dr. Donnorummo before registering for the course. There will be class everyday, either 2 or 4 hours, as well as meetings with diplomats, economic and political leaders, field trips and cultural events, as well as an excursion to Auschwitz. Dr. Donnorummo will have one lecture everyday, and on 7 days there will be an additional lecture delivered by guest specialists. The lectures will focus on national and/or continental identity, the political and economic transition being experienced in these two countries, their membership in the EU and NATO, and their political, cultural and economic Transatlantic relationship with the United States. Course evaluations will be based on class participation (20%), two short papers (30%), and a more extensive paper to be completed by 31 July (50%). There are two books for required reading: 1. Special attention will also be paid to how the EU affects politics and policies within and between its 27 member states.</p>

We will start with a brief historical background, followed by an examination of contemporary issues such as democratization, EU enlargement, ethnic conflict, nationalism, foreign policy doctrines and current economic and security challenges. No previous knowledge of the subject is required.

<p>This course introduces students to Russian fairy tales, a fascinating and productive genre of folklore that reveals a great deal about Russian traditions and modes of thought. Taking a psychological approach to the materials, the course examines not only the tale, but also the beliefs informing the magic world of these narratives. Since the humans, spirits, and beasts populating this world are richly portrayed in Russian art, a significant component of the course will consist of visual and audio representations of figures and scenes from fairy tales. We shall examine slides of posters, paintings, book illustrations, postcards, etc. and shall listen to music based on characters, situations, and narratives drawn from these tales (e.g., extracts from Glinka, Rimsky-Korsakov, Chaikovsky, Mussorgsky). This course satisfies the foreign culture requirement.</p>
