This course provides an introduction to the field of international economics. The course divides roughly in half between topics from international trade and from international finance. Topics to be covered include: comparative advantage; the effects of tariffs and other forms of protectionism; U.S. commercial policy; the balance of payments; exchange rates; and the international monetary system.

This three-credit economics program focuses on the history, politics, sociology, economics and culture of post-war Czech Republic and Poland. Students travel to both Prague and Krakow during this short-term program. Topics covered include the history of the European Union, political and economic developments in Eastern Europe, analysis of the main industries in each country, international trade, banking, education, health care, and tourism. The suggested prerequisite for this program is introductory-level economics. Past day trips and excursions have included tours of each city as well as trips to local museums, banks, and businesses. The program may include a tour of Prague Castle and a day trip to Auschwitz.

This course will examine the relationship between architecture and identity -- how architecture was used to shape national identities at various periods in response to changing social, economic, and political conditions; how architects shaped their identities through travel, education; how the use of technology, new materials, ornament, and manipulations of building typologies are used to shape institutional, corporate, and individual identities. The context for these examinations will be five cities formerly part of the Habsburg / Austro-Hungarian Empire -- the Czech capital, Prague; the former imperial capital, Vienna; the former provincial (now national) capitals Zagreb and Ljubljana; the industrial city Brno in the Czech Republic. The time span will encompass the Renaissance, Baroque, modern and contemporary periods. Major architectural themes that will be emphasized in this course include: (1) the development of different building types to serve modern needs (museums, hospitals, apartment housing, villa or pavilion type housing); (2) tectonics and the expression of construction; (3) debates about the function and meaning of ornament. The written and built works of the following major central European architects will be examined in detail: Josef Frank, Jozef Hoffmann, Adolf Loos, Josef Marie Olbrich, Jože Plečnik, Gottfried Semper, Otto Wagner, Hans Hollein, Zaha Hadid, and Wolf Prix (Coop Himmelb(l)au) as well as one house in Vienna designed by the philosopher Ludwig Wittgenstein. Classes will be held primarily on-site in Prague, Vienna, Brno, Zagreb, and Ljubljana.

The course will open with a detailed consideration of the context and causes of World War II, including World War I, the Versailles Treaty, and the Great Depression. We will discuss the determinants of Hitler's rise to power and of German expansionism in the 1930's. We will examine the military struggle of World War II, but such topics as economic mobilization, propaganda, occupation policies, resistance movements and the Holocaust also receive significant attention. The course concludes with an analysis of war-time diplomacy, the postwar settlement, and the onset of the Cold War.

The history of postwar Europe is particularly significant today, as current events are testing the strength of the European economic, political, and social institutions that developed after the end of the Second World War. Focusing on the social, political and economic changes that occurred in Europe after 1945, the course will cover a variety of themes. We will discuss topics ranging from postwar reconstruction, the Cold War, and European integration, to European relations with the United States and the so called Coco-colonization of Europe, as well as the impact and influence of the Soviet Union from the East. There will be a strong focus on using the history of postwar Europe to help analyze events occurring in Europe today, such as the Greek financial crisis, the refugee crisis, and the conflict in Ukraine.

Since the humans, spirits, and beasts populating this world are richly portrayed in Russian art, a significant component of the course will consist of visual and audio representations of figures and scenes from fairy tales. We shall examine slides of posters, paintings, book illustrations, postcards, etc., and shall listen to music based on characters, situations, and narratives drawn from the tales (e.g., extracts from Glinka, Rimsky-Korsakov, Chaikovsky, and Mussorgsky).

Project GO Intermediate Russian in Narva: 8 credits This intensive eight-week second-year language course will take place from June 19-August 13 in Narva, Estonia. Narva, located on Estonia's border with Russia, is a Russian-speaking city with a sizable Russian population. The course has three components. The first, intensive language classes which emphasize practical communication skills, will continue the basics of Russian grammar while emphasizing the acquisition of reading, listening, and speaking skills by the students. After completing the course, students will be able to converse with ease and confidence and use correct sentence structure when dealing with routine tasks and concrete situations, such as personal information, daily activities and interests, as well as physical and social needs, such as food, shopping, travel, and basic work requirements. The second component, a lecture series, will introduce students to topics in contemporary Russian and Baltic culture and politics. Third, excursions in and around Narva will showcase this unique region that is rarely visited by US students. Course objectives are to develop an active vocabulary in practical, everyday topics, particularly those topics which will prepare students for military service related to the Russian-speaking world, and to refine composition skills. Classes in Narva meet from 9:00 a.m. through 3:00 p.m. daily Monday through Friday. Students will also have weekly lectures and excursions. Prerequisite: one year of college-level Russian or equivalent proficiency.

Projcet GO Advanced Russian in Narva: 8 credits: This intensive eight-week third-year language course will take place from June 19-August 13 in Narva, Estonia. Narva, located on Estonia's border with Russia, is a Russian-speaking city with a sizable Russian population. The course has three components. The first, intensive language classes based on the communicative-functional approach to language learning, will develop linguistic proficiency in the four skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing and will use authentic texts and media materials to help students acquire lingual-cultural competence encompassing both high and popular culture. Students will work extensively to acquire advanced-level Russian grammar, syntax, vocabulary, and conversation and writing skills. The second component, a lecture series, will introduce students to topics in contemporary Russian and Baltic culture and politics. Third, excursions in and around Narva will showcase this unique region that is rarely visited by US students. Course objectives are to develop an active vocabulary in practical, everyday topics, particularly those topics which will prepare students for military service related to the Russian-speaking world, and to refine composition skills. Readings culled from Russian-language mass media are also a part of this course. Classes in Narva meet from 9:00 a.m. through 3:00 p.m. daily Monday through Friday. Students will also have weekly lectures and excursions. Prerequisite: two years of college-level Russian or equivalent proficiency.
