Lisa Bromberg is the Global Studies Center's Assistant Director of Outreach. She plans, develops, and implements Global Studies programming initiatives for the region's K-12 educators, as well as for the University and the greater Pittsburgh community.

Dr. Bromberg earned her Ph.D. in French Studies from the University of Pennsylvania. Her research focuses on the development of "Frenchness" in Revolutionary and post-Revolutionary French thought. She has written and presented extensively on the Dreyfus Affair and its impact on French identity and republicanism, on the political and social influence of writing from the margins, and on exile and island geographies in nineteenth-century French literature. She has presented at the Nineteenth Century French Studies Colloquium and at the Interdisciplinary Nineteenth Century Studies Colloquium. In addition to teaching undergraduate French language, culture, and literature, Dr. Bromberg has taught middle and high school French, and high school English in France. Her course topics have included France during World War II; Francophone cultures of Martinique, Senegal, and Morocco; and nineteenth-century History of Art and Architecture in France. As Head of Foreign Languages at the Tuxedo Park School, she also designed the K-9 French curriculum, mentored new teachers, and led pedagogy workshops on second language acquisition and teaching.

Dr. Bromberg developed her fluency in French during a year-long study abroad and homestay experience in French Provence with the American Field Service. She chose to spend two more years living and working in France, first on a junior year abroad program in Paris, run through her undergraduate institution, Sarah Lawrence College, and then working as an English

language teaching assistant in Montargis. She has also enjoyed extended stays living in Madrid and Sicily.
