Becoming Mexico: Culture, Politics and the Imagined Americas, a symposium organized by **Joshua Lund** (Hispanic Languages & Literatures) and **Gayle Rogers** (English)

Despite extended periods of political continuity, Mexico has traditionally been imagined as a space of instability. Mexican philosophers, poets, scholars, and statesmen have long reflected on the idea of Mexico as potential not yet realized, at once utopian and dystopian, an identity always in formation. The ambivalence of this cultural energy is intensified in the US context, where Mexico functions as a key referent in an astounding variety of culture wars.

In the terms of these debates, and all of the fear and desire that they imply, "Mexico," the geopolitical space, becomes "Mexicanization," a geocultural process of transformation: a potentially disruptive force that can weigh against an imagined purity of an exceptional American identity, or stand as a source of creative and economic renewal. What is the history of the idea of Mexico? "Becoming Mexico" reflects on this question through an interdisciplinary symposium featuring four speakers:

<u>Amigos del Cine Latinoamericano</u> <u>Fall 2012 Film Series</u>

Film: "Miss Bala" (2011, Director Gerardo Naranjo) (Spanish with English subtitles) Few films truly earn the adjective "relentless," but Gerardo Naranjo's "Miss Bala," about the encounter of a would-be beauty queen with a cartel and her struggles to survive the ensuing, violent 48 hours, reaches almost unbearable levels of tension. Naranjo composes his film with impeccably choreographed single takes keeping Laura, the protagonist, in the center of the action at all times, thus throwing the viewer into the maelstrom right alongside her. And when the terror is just about intolerable, the film builds to a glorious moment of dark humor that allows the audience the release of the most nervous kind of laughter.

It is fitting that this moment comes in the middle of a beauty pageant, as Naranjo's film uses the competition - nominally a celebration of beauty - to comment on the effects of the narcotics business in contemporary Mexico. In the middle of a drug war, no party is innocent.

Call for Papers

International conference: Resource Wealth and Regional Transformation in Latin America and the Caribbean

Over the past two decades all Latin American cities, from large metropolitan areas to small provincial towns, have been altered by the forces of globalizing. Expansively grown from the 1960s to the 1980s when rural migrants moved to the cities hoping to find a better future, today's cities have become nodes in international flows of people, money, goods and ideas. New generations of urbanites carry the traces of their parents' migration to the city, their daily struggles, failures and successes, while they search for new possibilities to get ahead in live. They attempt to take part in new consumption patterns and technical developments, and they aspire after modern or cosmopolitan lifestyles. Sometimes they become involved in transnational migration, or they benefit from the possibilities offered by education. In case that fails, they may look for alternative livelihoods, for example using the international illicit economic flows; as long as money and respect can be earned.

Globalized urban life offers new possibilities and challenges, but this never erases local histories. Even though absolute poverty levels have lowered, social inequality has notably increased, which causes new social ruptures. In this fast changing urban context, social patterns and cultural institutions that define society's unwritten rules of the game are rapidly being transformed. Family life, migrant organizations, grassroots initiatives, neighborhood networks, material culture, local ceremonies and participatory politics are a few of those "cultural resources of urban life", that have possibly acquired new meanings. This panels seeks to enhance theoretical perspectives on cultural resources in the globalizing Latin American city, with a specific focus on its socio-cultural ruptures and continuities. It aims to shed light on how

those resources, as society's "mortar", stay important and are being transformed at the same time.

LASA 2013 – XXXI International Congress

Proposed panel: "Transpacific Encounters: The micro-politics of China-Latin American development relations"

While interest in China-Latin American relations has increased significantly over the last few years in light of the booming economic relations between the two regions, little research exists on how those relations play out in terms of the nature and effects of specific interregional initiatives or development encounters on the ground.

This panel seeks empirical studies of China-Latin American encounters from throughout the region in order to illuminate the diverse qualities of these encounters and their potential effects on macro-level transpacific political relations. What do these encounters tell us about how China's presence in Latin America is materializing? Which sectors or initiatives are significant spaces of exchange? How are these encounters structured, and which actors are central to these processes?

Ideally, proposals would build upon and engage field research on specific development and cultural initiatives in Latin America and their reception/negotiation by particular constituencies. Current panel papers include research on Chinese diasporic politics in Cuba and Chinese development initiatives in Costa Rica, so proposals from other Latin American countries are especially encouraged.
