		 Students will split into groups to research one of four major parties involved in the conflict:
		Russia, Ukraine, the EU, and NATO. Groups will not research the United States since their
		coursework in the past has covered U.S. History and government.
		 Each group will use the links provided and/or their own credible sources to find and record important information about their party. They will start with the guiding questions, then find
		additional facts that they feel are important to the class' understanding of the conflict.
		 After groups have had time for individual research, they will share either by Jigsaw-ing or via a
		brief presentation & explanation to the whole class what they have learned about their assigned
		country or organization and its historical context and role in the current conflict.

		• As a class, we will review the steps the U.S. takes when conducting foreign policy. After an event
		happens (as in Step 0: the invasion), students will recall that the first step is Diplomacy, followed usually by economic sanctions and then military intervention or support, if deemed necessary.
		 The class will walk through a timeline of invasion together. Broken up into 5 groups (with the
		U.S. as a group this time), students will brainstorm & share what each group did (or should have
		done) at each of the stages of foreign policy listed.

Defensive alliance of the U.S. & Western European countries created to protect against the Soviet Union (Russia+) during the Cold War


