PS Micro-courses are developed around **emerging topics and research**. We conceive of the weekend as a module. With five or six speaker sessions, each weekend module provides ample opportunity to illustrate differences in disciplinary approaches to a central issue. The micro-course structure helps address two emerging aims for general education at universities:

- 1. Empowering students to engage in complex problem-solving
- 2. Engaging with interdisciplinary perspectives

The multi-disciplinary approach to the course content is leveraged as a space where inter-cultural and global learning occurs by **emphasizing perspective-taking**, **encouraging open mindedness**, **and promoting cultural awareness**.

Micro-courses attract students across majors and colleges at our respective universities, which allows students who may not interact with one another or hear from other disciplines the opportunity to do so. The lower number of credits/units and the weekend schedule provides students the flexibility to enroll with minimal disruption to increasingly packed schedules.

Topic - ECONOMICS OF GLOBAL HUMAN RIGHTS: This course will explore an emerging field in economic policy: the responsibility of private businesses to respect human rights globally. We will use the analytical tools provided by economic theory to consider the economic incentives that impact business interaction with key human rights issues and that shape economic policy responses. Human rights issues that we will discuss include modern slavery, internet freedom, and indigenous land rights. Economic policy responses to be considered include economic sanctions, international human rights due diligence laws, and socially responsible investment strategies. Learning resources will include primary source material from global governance institutions, civil society organizations, and international businesses and an opportunity to communicate directly with representatives from these arenas. Students will engage in directed research projects that develop their ability to combine economic analysis with primary source material and interdisciplinary perspectives to better understand complex social issues.

POVERTY AND DEVELOPMENT: A majority of the world's population lives in developing countries, on less than \$2 a day. This course will use microeconomic tools to gain a better understanding of the lives of the world's poor and of the challenges faced in the process of economic development. We will explore topics such as education, healthcare and microfinance, as well as investigate the functioning of labor markets, credit markets and government institutions. We will also cover methods to evaluate the effectiveness of policy interventions, using applications from developing countries around the world.

This capstone seminar focuses on slavery and abolition in the Atlantic World. We will explore the development of plantation slavery in European colonies, the growth of the transatlantic slave trade, efforts to abolish slavery in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, and discuss contemporary questions of reparations. Why did Europeans turn to African slave labor in their colonies? How did slave plantations operate and in what ways did slaves resist enslavement? Why did efforts to abolish slavery expand in the second half of the eighteenth century and why did it take another hundred years to ensure its abolition? In addressing these issues, you will practice the historian's craft. You will build on the skills that you acquired in Hist 1001 through source criticism and writing exercises. You will learn to define analytic questions to guide your own research, identify appropriate primary sources and scholarly literature, and write an argument-driven, evidence-based 15-page research paper in clear, compelling prose.

: The age of revolution has long been considered the beginning of global modernity ¿ the period in which liberal democracy declared victory over absolute monarchy, citizens over subjects, imperial nation-states over composite empires, the bourgeoisie over the nobility, industrialists over landowners, capitalism over feudalism, and wage-labor over slavery. This course will revisit this tumultuous and crucial era in world history, tracking the origin, course, and consequences of revolutionary movements as they crisscrossed oceans and continents. Building on the skills developed in HIST 1001, students will work with primary sources, think critically about secondary sources, craft analytical questions to guide their own research, identify the appropriate scholarly literature, and then write an argument-driven, evidence-based research paper in clear, compelling prose.

This course focuses on two central themes. The first considers how sport has been affected by the evolution of global capitalism and what that is meant for the changing nature of sport and the roles it plays around the world. The second looks at the benefits that have accrued from the relationship between sport and capitalism as well as the downside. The latter includes the degree to which sport can become a mean and vicious place; where youth are vulnerable commodities on a global supply chain, alienated from play, and damaged physically, neurologically, and emotionally by their commitment. We will look at efforts to reform sport; from problems in the baseball academy system in the Dominican Republic, the abuse of young boys in camel racing in the Persian Gulf, and sport for development efforts; and focus on countries that have structured sport in healthier ways, like Norway and New Zealand.

'Racial capitalism' is a concept that describes how the modern capitalist world-system developed and continues to operate in - "essentially racial directions" - meaning European industrialism likely could not have happened without commodifying and exploiting the labor of enslaved Africans, expropriating lands from indigenous groups, and extracting natural resources from those lands. In recent years, the concept has increased in popularity in a range of social science and humanities fields such as Black and Ethnic Studies, history, and geography. This is a graduate course that will include "classical" and contemporary works on the idea of racial capitalism and will focus on the ways scholars draw on the concept in order to shed light on varying issues: gender and sexuality, mass incarceration and the prison industrial complex, land theft and the climate crisis, reparations, and more.
