Ethical dilemmas in the practice of health care continue to proliferate and receive increasing attention from members of the health care profession, ethicists, policy makers, and the general public as health care consumers. In this course we will examine a number of ethical issues that arise in the context of contemporary medical practice and research by analyzing articles and decision scenarios. Topics to be covered typically include the physician-patient relationship; informed consent; medical experimentation; termination of treatment; genetics; reproductive technologies; euthanasia; resource allocation; and health care reform. Students who successfully complete this course will be able to identify and analyze different philosophical approaches to selected issues in medical ethics; have gained insight into how to read and critically interpret philosophical arguments; and have developed skills that will enable them to think clearly about ethical questions as future or current health care providers, policy makers, and consumers. This course is part of a core sequence leading to certification in the Conceptual Foundations of Medicine Certificate Program, and is a companion course to HPS 0612 (Mind and Medicine) but may be taken independently. The course is of particular interest to pre-medical and pre-health care students.

This course will be an in-depth exploration of a number of contested issues related to the practice of medicine, medical research and public health which are of philosophical, professional, and public policy concern. Some topics will include: the moral obligations of physicians and other healthcare professionals, patient autonomy, the definition and determination of death, organ donation, euthanasia and physician aided death, vaccination, and the moral imperatives and constraints distinctive to domestic and international medical and public health research. This course should be of particular interest to philosophy majors as well as to students who are contemplating a career in medicine, biomedical research, public health, or health law. Final papers will be on topics related to students' individual interests within the framework of the course. This course is an Approved Elective for the Undergraduate Certificate in Conceptual Foundations of Medicine. Prerequisite: at least one course in philosophy or history and philosophy of science or permission of the instructor.

As humans rely more and more on electronic devices to support their everyday activities, there are ever present warnings about the impacts such reliance has on human autonomy ranging from who owns and controls information networks, the inequitable impact of technology consumption on peoples and places, varying accessibility of technology around the globe, and the promises and limitations of technology in improving human health. By engaging in technology as a lens, this sequence of weekend micro-courses encourages students to examine technology as a system disproportionately impacting humanity by enabling and constraining human rights of groups of people around the globe. With a multi-disciplinary focus, the course invites researchers and practitioners from the University of Pittsburgh, Carnegie Mellon, and relevant fields more broadly. In this four-part weekend micro-course (spanning four semesters), we will examine the power of technology on humanity and its implications on social justice in four areas: governance, environment, education, and health.

<p>This course introduces the fundamental principles of geo-spatial analysis using ArcGIS Desktop and Microsoft Excel. It will focus on teaching students the principles of GIS through computer-based exercises and an individual project. Exercises will train students in acquiring and downloading data and imagery, analyzing, mapping and managing geospatial data in order to address predominately urban problems. An emphasis will be placed on bridging the gap between performing geo-spatial analyzes using GIS and designing cartographically correct and understandable outputs. Exercises and projects will be centered on topics and applications relevant to urban studies, political science, sociology and economics.</p>

<p>This course provides students with an opportunity to expand their knowledge of the core methods used for analyzing geo-spatial data using ArcGIS Desktop and gives students an introduction to how GIS is used in the community by planners, public administrators, researchers and data managers. Classroom projects will extend students' skills in acquiring and managing geo-spatial data, map design and solving spatially explicit problems. Students will complete a number of exercises and work on a semester long project of their choice. The content of the course is geared toward equipping students with a set of quantitative and geo-spatial tools that are relevant to careers in urban planning, non-profit organizations, public administration and economic and community development. Students who have not had an Introductory GIS course should contact the professor before enrolling.</p>
